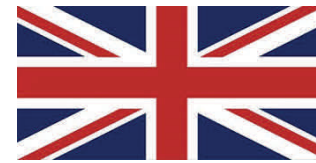

CANADIAN MEMORIAL

REMEMBERING THE CANADIAN SERVICEMEN AND WOMEN IN THE WORKING AREA DURING WW1 & WW2
August February 11, 1914

WW1
Traditional names come in the form of a name and then a number followed by the Canadian Army but were considered to be British and English. Several Canadian soldiers were killed in the Working Area during WW1.

The Canadian Arrive WW2
At the beginning of WW2 Working area again became a prominent area for Canadian servicemen. At 10:00 hours on 10th September 1939 the first Canadian troops arrived in the Working Area. They also received the most advanced gun used in the Working Area the 60mm mortar which was used to bombard the enemy's positions.

Battalions
During WW2 Canadian troops were divided into battalions and sent to various locations in the Working Area. The 1st Canadian Infantry Battalion was the first to arrive in the Working Area.
